St. Patrick's Day

March 17


Although St Patrick's day is not an official U.S. holiday, the U.S. has celebrated Irish and Irish American culture since the 1600s and Congress has designated March as Irish-American Heritage Month.





Historically, this holiday honored St. Patrick, who introduced Christianity to Ireland, but is now predominately a cultural celebration of Irish heritage. Public observance has included wearing the color green, eating, drinking, and parades. As a tradition, those who do not wear green may be "pinched by leprechauns". In D.C., celebrate with the St. Patrick's Day Parade, visiting St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Chinatown, or a themed run or bar crawl. Iconic symbols include the lucky four leaf clover, leprechauns, and the rainbow with a pot of gold.

NATIONAL CHERRY BLOSSOM FESTIVAL

Beginning <u>March 20-April 16</u>, the annual National Cherry Blossom Festival commences to celebrate the spring bloom of the Yoshino Cherry trees along the Tidal Basin and surrounding D.C. neighborhoods.

Sakuras were diplomatically gifted by Japan in 1912 as a showcase of friendship to the U.S.

Attend the opening ceremony, Pink Tie Party, Blossom Kite Festival, Petalpalooza, Japanese Street Festival and parades. Be on the look out for decorated cherry blossom sculptures hidden throughout the city. Check out all events here- most events are free.

PURIM

MARCH 06

A Jewish holiday, which commemorates the survival of the Jewish people after the unsuccessful planned persecution by the Persian Empire. The holiday begins at sunset March 06 and ends March 7 at sunset. This is a time of fasting, reflection on the story of Purim, and breaking of the fast at sunset. This is a joyful and happy period for the Jewish people. Common celebratory practices today include the exchanging gifts, donating money to charity, parties, and wearing costumes.

DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME MARCH 12

An American practice of advancing clocks by an hour for the duration of warmer months, so that darkness "begins" later in the day. Starts March 12 and ends Nov 5.



RAMADAN

MARCH 22

A Muslim holiday, which commemorates the revelation of the Qur'an, pre-dawn to sunset fasting for Godconciousness (taqwa), self-reflection, spiritual improvement, and refraining from negative acts. This holiday begins March 22 and ends April 20. This is a month long observance of fasting, prayer, reflection, and community. Common celebratory practices include breaking fast at sunset with other members of the Muslim community and meeting for prayers at the mosque. The ending of Ramadan is celebrated on the last day with Eid al-Fitr, "Festival of Sweets".

Take a free tour of American Red Cross founder Clara Burton's home in Glen Echo, Maryland, and learn about her life of dedicated humanitarian service.



BELMONT-PAULWOMEN'S EQUALITY NATIONAL MONUMENT HOUSE AND MUSEUM

Visit one of the headquarters of the National Women's Party, responsible for leading the suffrage movement and gender quality in the 20th century.
